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
Hi James, Brooke,

I am happy to bring in some thoughts on Monday as well. I tried to understand how the next phase of this kind of messaging can be more supported by SPI-B (or at least make sure the decisions are made having seen advice). The messages in this instance are kept so elusive by a small group of mainly No10 advisers - these are agencies that have won their political campaigns and are now supporting this one too. My team was never consulted either and as soon as I heard the message I flagged our concerns which mirror those of the group-only to be told it was too late now (and "it tested well" which often means a shut down of discussion of any risks!)

I think bottom line isn't they won't change the message now. Flagging concern is probably not wrong but I think it would be better to explore how to work more with them next time. And I am so sorry that despite being the behavioural scientists inside the government communications service we don't have a handle on this either. It's so often partially political and in this case I was also told they wanted to keep it deliberately small so that there's not too many cooks which is also a cultural issue.

I hope that made some sense! I will of course keep trying.

To add to the points already made:

- 1. We advise, ministers decide
- 2. Our advice has not been sought on what we believe is a new message that will go live at 7pm ie before SPI-B meeting tomorrow.
- 3. We have good reason to believe that this new message not only misses an opportunity to provide behaviourally specific and precise advice but also has the potential to do much damage thereby increasing R0 with all the expected negative health and economic consequences.

My proposal: James - as Chair of SPI-B - writes now to the Chair of SAGE documenting our concerns in the hope that he may be able to intervene before 7pm.

You certainly are not a lone worrier, Susan. I worry
1. that (if reports are accurate) this new advice is disastrous and will do damage in many ways - not least leading to different approaches in different parts of the UK and so creating a sense of inequity as well as confusion 2. that there is a danger that (as well as 'behavioural fatigue') this will be perceived as having a 'behavioural science' imprint and so undermine us both individually and at a disciplinary level.
Insofar as it raises issues about our general role and remit, and hence frames everything else, I also agree that should be at the top of the agenda.

Dear NR, James and colleague,
Given recent developments, I would like to suggest that item 6. be brought higher up the agenda and that we consider adding an item about our role and impact. The reason for suggesting this is that I was sent a message yesterday informing me that new messaging had been centrally trailed and would be "stay alert, control the virus and save lives". I sincerely hope that this is incorrect as it goes against several principles we have rehearsed many times in our advice to SAGE/Government - e.g. being behaviourally specific and being precise about what we are asking people to do. If it turns out to be true, it would be helpful to understand why we were not consulted given we have a bespoke Communications group and have been raising the problem of Government communications for several weeks, and offering to help and give advice directly.
I would be interested in others' views about this as I am worried about how things appear to be developing - and am not sure if I am a lone worrier - obviously we will have more information this evening.
