Update: reactivating shielding support during a January lockdown

Purpose The Cabinet Secretary for Health and Social Care asked for an update on

reactivating wave 1 shielding support for the duration of a renewed

lockdown period.

Priority Immediate, in advance of Cabinet on 4 Jan

Structures

- 1. During Wave 1 we introduced support underpinned by a range of structures and partnerships that included
 - National and local identification of people at highest clinical risk;
 - Sharing of data between partners, including NHS Boards, GP practices, Local Authorities, SMS service, food providers;
 - Setting up a national SMS service for Shielding hosted by NES;
 - A national helpline which diverted calls into Local Authority (LA) assistance centres with data reporting;
 - Close working with Local Resilience Partnerships (LRPs) and performance data collection from LAs:
 - National grocery box scheme;
 - Agreement with national retail partners to ensure access to supermarket delivery slots.

Changes and pressures since Wave 1

- 2. Since August 1, most of these structures and most of the support have remained in place, with some changes:
 - We have reduced the frequency of data updates on the shielding list from Public Health Scotland (PHS) to public sector partners from weekly to fortnightly due to reduced updates to the list;
 - We have reduced the frequency of calls with LRPs from 3x weekly national and 1x weekly regional calls to fortnightly regional calls and ad hoc national meetings by mutual agreement;
 - LA still respond to calls through the national helpful, but no longer make outbound calls:
 - Ending data collection on shielding performance from LAs;
 - An agreement to end the national grocery box scheme and not to reintroduce it, but instead depend on local partners to help with access to food issues;

- £15m flexible funding for Local Authorities entering Level 4 between November and the end of March, to enable them to respond to emergent need, including access to food, etc.
- The £100m Winter Plan for Social Protection, including funding for low-income families, communities and third sector, digital inclusion for older people and fuel poverty.
- We have greatly increased the information available to support people protect themselves.
- 3. Other material changes this winter include:
 - Seasonal pressures on local partners;
 - Test and Protect proactive outbound calls and additional support from LAs;
 - · Support for Covid vaccination programme;
 - Support for mass/community testing.

Assurance of local support during new January lockdown

4. Conversations with local partners have provided us with reassurance that the structures for providing local support along the lines delivered during Wave 1 are broadly in place, although the pressures outlined above may impact on the breadth of support offered. These can be summarised as follows (changes to Wave 1 in **bold**):

Identifying people at highest risk and data sharing	The data sharing agreements that underpinned the shielding response during Wave 1 remain in place.

SMS service	The SMS service will continue to provide updates						
	and to allow people to access services.						
National help line	The national help line has never been stood down. It						
	remains open and diverts calls to local assistance						
	hubs. It remains a crucial route for support.						
	We also receive regular statistical updates on the						
	types of support requested.						
Local Assistance Hubs	Local assistance hubs have remained open						
	throughout.						
	During Wave 1, we asked LAs to proactively contact						
	everyone on the shielding list in their area, as many						
	people on the list would not have been considered						
	at-risk under pre-Covid criteria. We collected data or						
	LAs performance, and by August, 97% of people of						
	the shielding list had been contacted by their LA by 1						
	Aug.						
	We are currently not proposing asking LAs to						

	make the same outbound calls to the entire shielding list in January, as many people have their own support networks and those that do not have been added to LA at-risk data bases. We could ask LAs to proactively contact those who they deemed at-risk during wave 1 (and people newly added to the list) during January; or to run a purely reactive service. Any asks of this kind would need to be weighed against the competing pressures on LAs set out in para 3, as such calls would compete with other services from local support hubs, including Test and Protect isolation support calls, which add to the protection to people who are at highest risk indirectly.
Supermarket delivery slots	Access to the supermarket deliver slots continues and registration has been extended.
National grocery box scheme	Ministers agreed in the autumn not to return to the national grocery box scheme, as support through LAs was considered more efficient and better value for money. £15m of flexible funding has been made available to LAs entering Level 4 to respond flexibly to need emerging from Level 4 restrictions, including access to food issues. We have agreed a review process for that funding with COSLA, which will allow us to reconsider the distribution and quantum of funding.
Local Resilience Partnerships	LRP structures continue in place and are ready to provide support to people at highest clinical risk where needed, although local government partners have flagged that the pressures set out in para 3 may impact on the breadth of support provided. For instance, during Wave 1, people received support for dog walking etc. Additional pressures may reduce support available in some areas to access to food, pharmacy and social isolation. We will review our current SG-LRP calls early this week, and likely reinstate the higher frequency we had in place during Wave 1.
Data collection	During Wave 1, LAs provided us with quantitative shielding performance data. We have not yet agreed a return to performance data collection with LAs. During Wave 1, we derived considerably greater assurance from our regular meetings with LRP partners nationally and locally than we did from the quantitative performance data we received from LAs. It is therefore an area we could consider waiving for this lockdown period in

order, reducing the burden on local partners without significantly reducing our ability to provide assurance, especially as we still receive data on support requested through the national help line.
