These are statutory independent expert advisory bodies on health sciences and the health scientist professions to the Welsh Government. COSC had taken a lead on contingency planning for Welsh Cancer services from the outset of the UK pandemic. I had worked closely with the Chief Scientific Advisor (Medicine) on a number of projects pre-pandemic.
 - b. I attended most of the TAG meetings after I joined. Not a core participant in terms of live discussion and presentation, but contributed to sidebar discussion, and disseminated relevant information to other national groups, as well as offline discussions with TAG members.
 - c. Cancer services related advice as necessary. Member of DATA-CAN, and DATA-CAN CCC part of the data-linkage research group based at SAIL, Swansea University.
