**Subject:** Border Health "quarantine" regulations: monitoring and enforcement functions

**Importance:** High

Regulations are being developed in each of the 4 Nations with a view to being brought into force on 8 June.

Ministers are keen for the Welsh regulations to have a clear PH focus (England's are a Home Office initiative), and for this to have clear read across to TTP. In England, PHE will be carrying out the monitoring function in terms of contacting travellers and UK returnees who are required to quarantine for 14 days. (There is talk that an antibody test at the airport could negate the need for some to quarantine.)

The request therefore is:

- That PHW write to all quarantining people immediately on arrival in Wales, and having received daily data from UKG Home Office which retains the database. Preferably for PHW to issue a letter by recorded delivery which clearly sets out the PH information and accompanied by telephone contact for monitoring.
- UKG estimates that there will be 3,000 travellers arriving in the UK. So roughly up to 150 arriving in Wales but to note that if travel patterns remain at present then that will be significantly less.
