There is uncertainty as to whether it includes outdoor activities which involve animals/birds such as pigeon racing, equine training, horse riding classes.
	It is also not clear whether it is implicit that in leaving home to take part in an outdoor activity, persons are permitted to travel to participate in the outdoor activity. For some outdoor activities involving animals/birds, it is necessary to travel and transport the animal/bird to take part in the activity.
