Issue: 1. The Health and well-being of our citizens

BRAG Rating

Detailed description:

DOH -68 ICU beds available, 42 occupied, 26 are available.

- -4 of the patients in the 42 occupied beds have suspected/confirmed Covid-19
- -There are no new suspected/confirmed cases in ICU within the last 24 hours.
- -There are currently national supply chain issues regarding replenishment orders of PPE products.
- -The NI Blood Transfusion Service (NIBTS) has requested DoH assistance in linking with other Departments in relation to establishing additional venues for blood donation sessions.

-The Belfast Trust continues to experience a high demand for testing in the RVH POD. The order of testing gives utmost priority to COVID-19 patients with serious illness (Groups 1 and 2), and urgent investigation of clusters/outbreaks (Group 3), above all other requests; if laboratory capacity permits, then symptomatic HCWs could be tested, as long as it does not impact in any way on delivery of diagnostic testing for groups 1-3. Continuing pressure is being put on Departments to facilitate testing for asymptomatic health care workers (HCWs) and critical industry workers who are self-isolating due to exposure to a Covid-19 case or a family member with a new cough and/or temperature.

-BOC Ltd have requested that their NI employees be given 'key status' and a letter of confirmation of same, to enable BOC NI employees to move freely in the event of a full lockdown. BOC are the sole supplier of medical Oxygen to the Trusts, pharmacies and 4,000 homecare patients across NI. Contingency planning with trusts includes the availability of personnel on site to fill cylinders and for drivers to deliver both cylinder packages and in bulk liquid form.

DE - The closure of schools to pupils other than vulnerable children and those of key workers.

What are the specific impacts?

DoH - As the number of cases of patients presenting with COVID-19 increase, staff in primary, secondary and social care sectors are in danger of being at risk of infection transmission.

Unless additional venues can be sourced, the number of blood donations will greatly reduce and result in the existing supplies in the blood bank being run down to dangerously low levels. Current donation levels have reduced by 15% The inability of BOC NI employees to report for work will impact greatly on the supply of medical oxygen to healthcare facilities and home patients.

DAERA -If pollution incidents affecting water abstraction points

DE - A particular impact on those children who are entitled to free school meals. For some of these children and young people, a school meal may be the only healthy meal they receive each day.

Arrangements for examinations could have a major impact on the future prospects of children including their examinations and entry into the next level of education or the workplace.

DOJ - Current situation is stable across all operational areas within the Northern Ireland Prison Service (NIPS). Staffing levels are starting to be impacted significantly and decisions have been taken to respond to this. No incidents of unrest have been caused.

DfC - 10,000 new claims for Universal Credit in w/c 16th March (1800 in w/c 9th March) Universal credit 12,000 telephone calls answered which is more than double the normal level.

As the number of cases of patients presenting with COVID-19 increase, staff in primary, secondary and social care sectors are in danger of being at risk of infection transmission.

Issue: 2. Economic well-being

BRAG Rating

Detailed description:

DoF - Account NI is vital to keeping money flowing in the economy to all sectors (business, individuals and staff). There is no clear message from within NICS identifying that Account NI and HR Connect are essential services. Within these bank funding, payment issue and payroll are deemed as key priorities and the staff delivering them are therefore Key Workers. These will have to be prioritised over less critical Account NI and HR Connect services.

DAERA - Basic Payment Scheme (BPS) support for Farmers continues via phone and online. Livestock market owners have indicated that all activities have been suspended from today.

FM/dFM announce two business support schemes on 18 March to provide immediate assistance to small businesses and those in the Tourism, Hospitality and Retail sectors. DoF is now working with DfE to identify payment mechanism for Small Business and Tourism, Hospitality, and Retail sectors to receive the £10,000 and £25,000 cash grant as soon as possible. (SPAR, LPS, NI Direct, Account NI)

What are the specific impacts?

DoF - ESS ACNI - We are having to operate with minimum staffing.

DAERA - BPS makes up a large proportion of farm incomes and any impact on this would affect Farmer Cash flow in October when 100% of payments would be paid in 2020.

Industry teleconference held today to discuss how farmers trade stock with marts closed

Assistance will alleviate cash flow pressures of these businesses and protect employment.

Detailed description:

- DfC Key priorities to ensure grant funding extensions and flexibilities and to develop a Community Contingency
 Fund to support delivery of key services through the voluntary and community sector. Concerns about impact of
 outbreak on organisations within the Arts Sector.
- **DoF 1.** Local council registrars need to be available to deal with birth, marriage and death registrations. There are approx. 100 in northern Ireland but a number of them have underlying health issues so are not in work. Registrations of deaths in particular require a lot of information from the informant and so there is a lot of time spent with the member of the public. **2.** General Register Office (GRO) staff a small team of 24 (not FTE) 17% are off with underlying medical conditions, self isolating or social distancing. We support the Registration process and will have to take it over if the councils are struggling.

What are the specific impacts?

- **DfC** Continuation of grant funding required by 1st April to ensure delivery of essential services. Community Contingency Fund required to enable VCS to respond to the developing situation. Community disruption and cancellation of events is having a significant impact on the Arts Sector.
- DoF Not currently but as deaths increase it may affect burials etc.
- · DoJ Supporting resilience of those delivering services to/assisting the bereaved in an excess deaths situation.

What is being done about it? (Tolerate, Treat, Transfer): Treat

- DfC Treat Priority being given to completion of economic appraisals, new contracts for funding and making
 payments to the voluntary and community sector. Plans being developed to launch Community Contingency
 Fund. Consideration being given to what level of assistance can be provided to organisations ion the Arts Sector.

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Issue: 4. Our delivery priorities and service delivery RAG Rating

Detailed description:

- FSA needs to consider the potential impact of the outbreak on food safety concerns.
- Local Authorities are at the front line of incident management. It is not clear what assessment LAs have made to ensure they
 are able to continue operation if staff are taken ill. Hence there is concern that Local Authority resources are diverted away
 from food safety issues to deal with the outbreak leading to public health issues
- DFC Concerns from local government re: loss of revenue streams. A request for the scheme of Emergency Financial
 Assistance to be activated.
- DoF Secure Remote Access (SRA) is currently limited to 10,000 users due to band width. Urgent activities are covered, however greater access is required. Urgent work is being carried out to address this issue.
- · DoJ Limitations to delivery of some NI Courts services (future reporting will include the wider justice sector)

What are the specific impacts?

- 1) Any of these key concerns could present a food safety risk, increase the probability of an incident occurring. In a worst case scenario, these issues could endanger public health.
- 2) Lack of focus and /or business continuity on the part of LAs may negatively affect their ability to respond to incidents, especially if the COVID-19 outbreak causes an increase in food complaints and incidents of foodborne illness.
- 3) DFC Estimated loss of £7.2m due to closure of leisure facilities over a 6 month period.
- 4) DoF Ability for staff to work at home restricted to 10,000 users
- 5) Decrease in overall footfall in court buildings, decrease in overall business levels and increase in case adjournments. Reduction in the number of available staff (both through social distancing and other absences such as underlying heath conditions and self- isolating)

- 1)Treat FSA working with Defra to assess the situation. Impacts and mitigations to shortages of specific materials and potential food safety issues are being developed.

Issue: 5. Our people BRAG Rating

Detailed description:

FSA: People plan is in place with guidance for staff including FAQs developed and published on Digital Workplace. FSA urgently considering the impact implementation of likely central government interventions. Current approach is to follow HMG advice maintaining on avoiding travelling to work unless strictly necessary. FSA receiving requests from other government organisations for resource support in handling the outbreak.

DOF: Staff absence in DOF

DE: staff are eager for further clarity on working arrangements especially in relation to Health and Safety.

ESS ACNI - Essential payments to keep the economy going and the introduction of COVID 19 mitigation measures. Funding of public sector bank accounts. Payroll.

DAERA: Staff needing PPE to carry out priority work

What are the specific impacts?

FSA: Failure to address this issue may result in increased risk of infection of FSA staff and potential unilateral action by individuals. Multiple approaches may affect business continuity and ability to run external meetings, including conferences and interviews.

DoF: Many staff homeworking not yet having impact on critical services

School closures may impact ability of key staff to carry out normal working roles/respond to critical issues.

DAERA public offices have reduced contact with the public and are encouraging online and telephone services.

DFC 1509 staff not in office (increase from 1024 on 19th March). 164 of these staff are working from home.

Ability for NICS Staff to work from home limited to 10, 000 workers due to bandwidth

DE – impact on staff morale and availability (RAG; Green)
