Key Developments Update

- SOSNI, the Tánaiste, the FM & DFM of NI, and both jurisdictions' respective health ministers spoke yesterday. Joint statement here.
- 30,213 tests have been carried out as of midnight Monday 30 March. Over the past week, the positivity rate for tests carried out increased from 6% to 15%, in line with the objectives of the revised, more restrictive, testing criteria. However, Health Minister Simon Harris said today that Ireland expects global shortages in the supply of reagents could lead to a slowing in testing. He said that at present 1,500 people a day were being tested, well below the target of 15,000, but that Ireland was still testing more people per head of population than most EU countries.
- The National Public Health Emergency Team (NPHET) met yesterday, and issued several new recommendations, including on how better to support staff in nursing homes. There are clusters of infection in 24 nursing homes. A cluster is comprised of at least three people, and there are 118 clusters of infection across Ireland. Their recommendations here:
- To focus contact tracing on suspect cases within prioritised groups. The Health Protection Surveillance Centre to update guidance to GPs and contact tracing teams
- O Contact tracing to encompass the period from 48 hours prior to the onset of symptoms given the risk of asymptomatic transmission
- In response to infections in long term residential care (nursing homes, disability and mental health)
 and homecare settings NPHET will work with the Health Service Executive to identify a number of measures
 which can be taken to strengthen support to staff and providers of nursing home care
- Taoiseach Leo Varadkar spoke to Chinese Premier Li Keqiang yesterday to thank China for sending essential medical supplies. Further shipments are on their way. Ireland has offered to help China in research and to maintain close contact.
- The HSE says it is planning for peak numbers to occur between 10-14 April. Worst case projections have suggested that the number of patients, requiring intensive care, could rise to a peak of 546 a day, by mid-April. N.B. This assessment was made before stricter measures were implemented on 27.3.
- The first flight delivering PPE from China arrived as part of a 10 flight/€208m deal. This shipment, worth €28m contained masks, gowns and eye shields. Nine further flights are expected.

Key Risks

- BNs not at greater risk than the rest of the public.
- Ireland's usual 5.6 ICU beds/100,000 would make it the most vulnerable country in Europe in terms of the possibility of being overwhelmed by Covid-19 ICU admissions. However, there have been efforts to increase the number of ICU beds in recent weeks. The fact that private hospitals are now available for treating covid-19 cases has also increased capacity (see below).

Covid-19 and Health Situation Description

- The latest assessment has shown there are 118 clusters of infection (defined as involving at least three cases). 22% of clusters are located in private houses, 20% in nursing homes and 18% in hospitals.
- The death rate has risen to 2.4% of infections compared with 0.6% a week ago.

- -11,000 inpatient beds, 2,300 day beds, 47 ICU beds and 54 high dependency unit beds
- The HSE have said there are now 500 ICU beds in Ireland, up from 255 pre covid-19. Ireland has 88 coronavirus patients in ICU units at present.
- The HSE is preparing to open a coronavirus isolation and stepdown facility at the Citywest hotel and conference centre with the ability to accommodate over 1,000 people.
- A new 'contact tracing app' that will alert people when someone close to them has the virus, is being developed, the HSE confirmed. It is likely to be rolled out in the next 10 days or so, and will be an opt-in system.

British Nationals

Behavioural and social interventions

The Scientific Advisory Group for Emergencies (**SAGE**) has asked certain posts to list the behavioural or social measures host authorities are taking to contain or delay the spread of the virus through social transmission to inform the UK's domestic response. Please include the date when measures were announced.

1. Restrictions over large public or mass gatherings:

No social gatherings allowed other than members of the same household

Closures of crèches, school or HE establishments:

All closed until at least April 19 – to date no special arrangements in place for children of key workers or vulnerable children.

3. Isolation measures for individuals or households suspected or confirmed of being infected:

Self-isolation for 14 days for affected individuals / households.

4. Requirements on social distancing, such as home working and closures of non-essential shops:

All requested to social distance with increased monitoring but no fines for non-compliance, stay at and work from home in all circumstances other than prescribed jobs businesses and services. See:

5. Measures to protect the elderly or vulnerable groups self-isolating or in social care, and interventions to strengthen the social care sector:

Charity 'Alone' has helpline for older people. Some shops have special opening hours for vulnerable people. Many local and community initiatives. Many government welfare initiatives: six day waiting period for Illness Benefit removed; rate of Illness Benefit increased from €203 to €350 per week.

6. Level and speed at which authorities are carrying out testing:

41 test centres have been created nationwide. At-home tests also available. To be eligible for a test you need to have a fever + another major symptom + be in a priority group. This criteria was introduced on 25 March after it was found only 6% of tests were coming back positive and with a large backlog having developed. Approx. 30,000 tests have been carried out. Now testing 1,500 / day, well short of target of 15,000 / day but above the EU average.

7. City or regional lockdowns, curfews or specific travel restrictions, and instructions provided to workers?

People should wfh in all circumstances. People only meant to go out to: buy essential supplies, care for someone in need, exercise (within 2km), essential work.

8. What advice and provisions, such as childcare, are given to critical workers such as emergency services?

Government exploring providing childcare for early-years children of critical workers. Trainee police sworn in and put on active service. Health system and armed forces being bolstered by recruitment of retired staff.

Economics impacts and response

· Update on host governments' fiscal, monetary and other responses to support individuals, industries and the wider economy.

- Central Government: The European Commission approved Ireland's €200 million scheme, in line with EU State aid rules, to provide financial support to Irish companies affected by the coronavirus outbreak.
- The Government has issued a <u>list of workers</u> who can continue to leave home to go to work amid the latest restrictions. This is in addition to staff working <u>in essential retail outlets</u>, who may also continue to work.

Key Developments Update

- The Chief Medical Officer said that although yesterday saw the largest number of new cases of coronavirus in Ireland to date, the rate of increase was slowing. Infections had been rising at a daily rate of 33% before restrictions were imposed. The rise has now slowed to a daily increase of around 15%. The CMO said this was an 'encouraging sign in our efforts to flatten the curve'.
- Tánaiste Simon Coveney is to discuss cooperation in tackling the coronavirus pandemic with Northern Ireland Secretary Brandon Lewis and Stormont's first and deputy first ministers, Arlene Foster and Michelle O'Neill in a teleconference today.
- The Taoiseach said the Government was not going to close Irish borders to stop the spread of the virus (in response to calls from some). He said there were Irish people abroad who still need to come home, and said imports and exports needed to continue. However, the Taoiseach did confirm that the National Public Health Emergency Team will consider further measures that can be taken to reduce imported cases and tackle the concentration of cases taking place in care homes. BE Dublin will report on any new measures introduced.

- 10,700 people are still waiting for a Covid-19 test with another 4,000 waiting for a test appointment. Ireland is now testing around 5,000 people a day.
- The Health Service Executive (HSE) said it had secured 60,000 more test kits this week and is expecting to procure a further 100,000 a week going forward.
- The HSE says it is planning for peak numbers to occur between 10-14 April. Worst case projections have suggested that the number of patients, requiring intensive care, could rise to a peak of 546 a day, by mid-April. N.B. This assessment was made before stricter measures were implemented on 27.3.
- The first flight delivering PPE from China arrived as part of a 10 flight/€208m deal. This shipment, worth €28m contained masks, gowns and eye shields. Nine further flights are expected.
- Repatriation of UK and Irish nationals from Peru continues.

On 27/3 Ireland announced stricter measures in response to the spread of Cov-19 and on the advice of the Public Health Emergency Team. The new measures came into place on 28.3 for a two week period.

Press Lines/Media

Two UK-based university professors, Dr Gabriel Scally of Bristol University and Dr James McInerney of Nottingham University, provided critical commentary in the Irish media today. They suggested that the UK was in denial about the seriousness of the virus until recently and that we were not following the science. Dr Scally suggested that Northern Ireland should look to Ireland and not to the UK.

The Ambassador has written an oped for publication in the Irish Independent tomorrow, in which he challenges these comments and other critical pieces from the past week. He also highlights the cooperation between the UK and Ireland.

Q: Why are the UK and Irish positions so different on tackling COVID-19?

A: Both governments are doing everything they can to delay and to flatten the curve. We are each following the advice of our expert scientists, especially our Chief Medical Officers. We may sometimes take different steps but our shared objectives are protecting our health services and saving lives.

Situation Update

- 121 new cases. Total = 906 cases in Ireland. Fourth death announced.
- New restrictions to enforce social distancing are expected. The scheme is expected to be a payment by the government which employers can top up, but not a salary-linked payment like in Denmark or the UK.

- Still very few enquiries to Malaga on the COVID-19 situation in Ireland.
- No consular cases have been registered from BNs seeking to return home, or seeking assistance with treatment.

Post Operations

- Embassy is now on crisis watch with majority of staff working remotely, and a shift pattern to ensure a limited physical presence in the building. Remote working is functioning well.
- Coronavirus Taskforce established to cover policy and corporate aspects of Post response.

Cross-Whitehall / External Partners

- SOSFA spoke to Tánaiste on 20 March. They agreed on the importance of the CTA and the need for coordination on travel advice; discussed EU border closures; and discussed different national approaches to COVID-19.
- SOSNI spoke to Tánaiste on 20 March.
- SOS for Transport spoke with Transport Minister Shane Ross on 20 March.
- The PM spoke with the Taoiseach on 19 March. They agreed to be in touch and to align actions as much as possible.
- Cabinet Secretary Mark Sedwill spoke with Sec-Gen Martin Fraser on 18 March. Both agreed on the need for close cooperation and named leads in both administrations who would take this forward.

Travel Advice / Press lines/Media

 UK and Ireland coordinated to update travel advice on Friday 20 March, advising that the availability of cross-Irish Sea travel may reduce, and that visitors to Ireland from GB and Irish visitors to GB should pay close attention to announcements from airlines and ferry companies.
