# **Main Developments**

- There have been a further 3 deaths reported, bringing the total number of deaths to 504.
- NISRA report up until the period ending 15th May, a total of 664 deaths involving COVID-19 occurred.
- SportNI publish advice and guidance on the return of sport as coronavirus restrictions are lifted.
- HMG Mortgage payment holidays can be extended for three months.
- ONS revealed that UK borrowing surged to £62bn in April, the highest monthly figure on record.
- Traffic flows for Thursday 21 May up 1.3% on Wednesday and up 15.1% on the previous Thursday. This was the highest daily flow since the first day of lockdown.







### Switzerland

Libraries and museums reopened on 11 May, with strict distancing measures.

Zoos, swimming pools, mountain railways, cinemas and theatres may open on 8 June, when gatherings of more than five people may be permitted

# Italy

Italy has already implemented some measures equivalent to Step 3.

Italy have re-opened Museums this week. Beaches have opened and church services have also resumed, including a public mass at the Vatican.

Gyms and swimming pools can also reopen next week.

The Bundesliga was the first major European football league to return (behind closed doors), strict safety protocols will protect those involved.

In the Netherlands Cinemas, restaurants and cafes, and concert halls and theaters will be allowed to open, subject to conditions: a maximum of 30 people (including staff) and 1.5 meters distance.

# Sweden

Allowance of summer activities for children (born 2002 and after), if they are close to home and in smaller groups. A risk tool with precautionary measures for organisers are presented with different criteria to evaluate.

Training and activities should be outside and distance kept when eating and sleeping.

What is a smaller group is not defined, the event ban more than 50 people is still valid. (Indoor cinemas never closed)



#### Key Takeaway



- South Korea did not impose the same lockdown restrictions as seen in Europe. A strategy of test, track and trace from the first case has flattened the curve.
- A case study of a Covid cluster found that Gyms have a high transmission risk due to environmental factors.

#### **Track and Trace**

South Korea developed tools and practices for aggressive contact tracing during the MERS outbreak in 2015. They used this system to find, test — and, if necessary, isolate — anyone Covid positive person may have had contact.

26 Days before Day 1

#### Test

Gov officials meet with representatives from several medical companies to begin immediately developing coronavirus test kits for mass production – 2 weeks later country produces 100k kits per day.



# **Current Media and Communications (2 of 2)**

#### **UNITED KINGDOM**

- The Heathrow isolation facility, set up by the UKG as a self isolation facility for people arriving from countries worst hit by coronavirus, has seen it's last guest leave.
- The UK will host the Global Vaccine summit on 4 June taking lead role on the £7.4 billion fund-raising effort for vaccine alliance, focusing on both COVID-19 and non-COVID-19 programmes.
- UCL and London School of Hygiene and Tropical Medicine report that children and adolescents are half as likely to catch coronavirus.
- Sage has published evidence on the safety and impact of reopening schools suggesting the risk of coronavirus to pupils is "very, very small but it is not zero."
- ONS revealed that UK borrowing surged to £62bn in April, the highest monthly figure on record after heavy spending to ease the coronavirus crisis.
- Sage member Pro Ian Boyd has said that locking britain down a week or two earlier would have made a "big difference" to the coronavirus death rate.

#### REPUBLIC OF IRELAND

- It has been suggested that Ireland has one of the highest rates of COVID-19 deaths in care homes in the world according to a report by the International Long Term Care Policy Network.
- Irish Times Small and medium-sized charities are facing funding losses of €1.5 billion this year because of COVID-19, according to a data analytics company specialising in the non-profit sector.
- RTE Irish government is expected to make it mandatory for all travellers arriving in Ireland to provide an address to gardaí and to self-isolate there for two weeks.
- RTE IRFU chief executive Philip Browne has issued a stark warning about the financial viability of professional rugby and other sports amid the coronavirus pandemic.
- Senior Gardaí have warned Government officials that new COVID-19 restrictions are unenforceable.

#### **OTHER**

- More than 5 million people globally have are now confirmed to have coronavirus according to John Hopkins University, with 1.9 million people recovering and 328,0000 deaths.
- Yemeni health system has collapsed as COVID-19 spreads according to the United Nations who are appealing for urgent funding.
- The death toll in Brazil reaches 20,000.
- 2.4 million Americans sought unemployment benefits last week, bringing the total since mid March to roughly 38.6 million, almost a quarter of the workforce.








