Vaccination Programme

8. Patricia Donnelly provided an update on the vaccination programme. She outlined the accelerated model for delivering the booster vaccine, including: GP practices providing vaccinations to over 18s where they have capacity; Trusts utilising larger venues for vaccine centres; and Community Pharmacies delivering to over 18s. Ministers placed on record their thanks to Patricia and all those involved in the vaccination programme.

R paper update / Omicron modelling

- 9. The Chief Scientific Advisor provided an update on the current position in relation to the delta variant, noting a steady level of cases and a slow decline in test positivity and hospital inpatients. He outlined the position in relation to the Omicron variant, advising that it was much more transmissible than delta (with a projected doubling time of around 2.4 days) and that without further intervention cases could rise to over 10k per day by the New Year. He noted that it was still not known the extent to which these cases will lead to hospital admissions, but suggested Omicron would need to be around 90% less severe than delta not to result in an increase in admissions. He provided some outline modelling and advised that in order for the 'pessimistic' scenario to be avoided additional measures may be necessary in addition to the accelerated booster vaccination programme. The Chief Medical Officer advised of the importance of introducing additional measures immediately after Christmas, and noted that the Health Service was likely to come under severe pressure.
- 10. Ministers discussed the factors involved in determining the introduction of additional measures to combat Omicron. The First Minister noted that the Executive would meet next Wednesday to consider additional data and discuss possible additional measures.
