The Cabinet Office circulated the following papers to inform the Committee's discussion:

- SAGE Update
- Approach to social distancing measures.

COVID-19

Item 1: SAGE Update

- 1. The CHAIR invited the Government Chief Medical Officer (CMO) to set out the current position of the COVID-19 epidemic in the UK. The CMO said that the direction of travel was consistently going the right way with hospitalisation and death numbers going down and that the UK was past the peak. CMO noted that any changes to lockdown measures needed to be cautious as there were still a significant number of people in the UK that had the virus, and that the UK was not able to use Test, Track and Trace. There was some scope to lift local lockdown measures but if this was done too fast there would be an increase in R, too slowly and there was a risk of entering winter months. CMO noted that other countries that had lessened lockdown restrictions had seen an increase in the R number.
- 2. The CHAIR invited the Government Chief Scientific Advisor (GCSA) comment. The GCSA said that stage 1 changes presented a low risk of pushing R above 1 so supported the move to phase 2. The GCSA said that there was a need to make more 'head room' during Phase 2 before a decision was taken to move into Phase 3.

Item 2: Approach to social distancing measures

- 3. The CHAIR invited the Secretary of State for the Department of Health and Social Care to present the paper on social distancing measures. The SECRETARY OF STATE FOR THE DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH AND SOCIAL CARE said that the stay at home message remained central. Nuanced changes to the measures centered around outdoor activity where evidence suggested that the risk of transmission was low. The outdoor activity messaging would make clear people could be outside for recreational purposes, not just exercise, within their household. Additionally, changes of messaging would encourage people to return to work if they could not work from home.
- 4. Continuing, the SECRETARY OF STATE FOR THE DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH AND SOCIAL CARE said that proposed changes in June and July included a return of year one and year six pupils to schools with the introduction of smaller classes sizes, a phased re-opening of non-essential retail and (in July) phased opening of hospitality, with social distancing measures in place. All decisions were contingent on epidemiology. Guidance on facemasks on public transport and in shops would be communicated.
- 5. The CHAIR invited the Director of Government Communications to outline the communications approach. The DIRECTOR OF GOVERNMENT COMMUNICATIONS said that communications were based on a plan, on the science and were transparent. The messaging was not contradictory to the stay at home messaging but moved with maximum caution to enable outdoor activity and reinforce the behaviours of staying alert through handwashing and staying at home.
- 6. In discussion the following points were made:
 - The Joint Biosecurity Centre had been discussed between the Four Nation CMOs. It
 was proposed that public health information and other sources will come together for
 a more granular view locally of flare-ups and the centre will provide response support

- to local authorities in their response to flare-ups. A five point alert scale was proposed, allowing the public to understand the risk.
- There was agreed commitment of the Four Nations approach and the importance of a predictable and reliable sharing of information.
- Recognition that it may be appropriate for difference in approach/speed depending on the scientific evidence but messaging was crucial and should not undermine the Four Nations approach or stay at home messaging.
- There was broad support for the Joint Biosecurity Centre with all four nations indicating a willingness to be involved.
- There had been a large number of people in outdoor spaces, particularly in London's parks the previous day.
- The importance of staggered journeys remained to ensure the transport networks could implement social distancing measures.
- The Department for Work and Pensions should remain a key part of the changing workplace measures.
- 7. In summing up the CHAIR confirmed the core messaging remained to stay at home with nuanced messaging where it was appropriate, based on the science, such as outdoor activities and certain sectors being able to continue to work when they cannot work from home.

Item 3: The Border

8. The CHAIR highlighted the on-going work on UK border measures, contained within the paper. The work would develop in the coming days and would be continually reviewed.
