Vulnerable Children, Young People and Safeguarding (VCYPS) workstream Phase 1: March 2020 – early September 2020

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1. Background

This paper provides a summary of phase 1 (March 2020 – early September 2020) of the Vulnerable Children, Young People and Safeguarding (VCYPS) workstream: the main issues it intended to address, the plan, the risks identified, the achievements and the lessons learnt.

a. Vulnerable Children, Young People and Safeguarding (VCYPS) workstream

In response to the covid-19 pandemic, the ensuing closure of schools (20th March 2020) and national lockdown (26th March 2020), the cross-governmental VCYPS workstream was established.

The VCYPS workstream includes policy leads from education, children and families, housing, communities, health and social services.

In addition, an external advisory group includes representatives from the Children's Commissioner, Inspectorates, third sector, Youth Board, National Safeguarding Board, Directors of Education, Directors of Social Services, the Police, Public Health Wales, the ACE Hub and Child and Adolescent Psychology. The purpose of this group is to share intelligence and to identify any risks and gaps, and to feed its output into the VCYPS workstream.

b. Phase 1 (March 2020 – early September 2020): ensure that vulnerable children and young people are 'safe, seen and heard'

During phase 1 (March 2020 – early September 2020), the VCYPS workstream's primary aim was to ensure that *vulnerable* children and young people were '*safe, seen and heard*' during the initial crisis.

For the purpose of provision in schools, hubs and/or registered childcare settings, vulnerable children were defined as *children with a social worker and children with statements of special educational needs who would most benefit from the provision.* Local authorities had the flexibility to also offer a place to those on the edge of care, if they were known to be vulnerable by the school or family support services.

Through mapping of departmental work and plans, and intensive communication and engagement, the VCYPS workstream facilitated consideration, prevention and mitigation of

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the impact of the covid-19 pandemic and the ensuing restrictions on vulnerable children and young people.

c. Phase 2 (September 2020 – current): ensure that all children and young people are 'safe, seen, heard, nurtured and developing'

As the covid-19 pandemic evolved and worsened again, and local (7th September 2020) and national (19th October 2020) lockdowns were introduced, it became clear that the crisis-recovery model was no longer appropriate to guide the work of the group.

It was recognised by the group that the covid-19 related restrictions make all children and young people potentially vulnerable in a wide range of areas, including physical and mental health, emotional wellbeing, educational development, job security, (parental) income and housing stability, both in the short and the long term. Additionally, children and young people are at risk of going repeatedly "out of sight" during consecutive closures of local facilities and services for outbreak control, periods of self-isolation and local and national lockdowns.

The primary aim of the VCYPS workstream was therefore extended to ensuring that **all** children and young people are '**safe**, **seen**, **heard**, **nurtured and developing**'.

The definition of vulnerability was also extended. The decision on vulnerability and related support is now made and regularly reviewed on a case by case, multi-agency basis. Professionals should take into account the impact of any restrictions on the child or young person's emotional, mental and physical health and educational development, as well as the views of the child or young person and their parents and carers.

The work of VCYPS phase 2 is outside the scope of this report.

d. VCYPS phase 1 (March 2020 – early September 2020): context

It is important to read and interpret the content of this paper in its temporal context.

Table 1 presents a timeline of covid-19 in Wales and the period of time covered by phase 1. Events that had a major impact on children and young people have been highlighted in blue. The period covered by phase 1 has been marked in green.

VCYPS phase 1 covered the immediate crisis response to the covid-19 pandemic reaching Wales, the closing (20th March 2020) and reopening (29th June 2020) of schools, the national lockdown (26th March 2020), 'Stay local' rule (1st June 2020) and phased reopening (22nd

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June 2020) and the 12 week shielding period for extremely vulnerable people (24th March 2020 – 16th August 2020).

During this time, a second covid-19 wave was a theoretical possibility in certain epidemiological models; further local, firebreak and national lockdowns were not yet on the horizon; mass vaccination was a distant hope; variants of concern had not yet been identified.

The general thinking was that, in line with the traditional response model to natural disasters, the response to the covid-19 pandemic would consist of a first – crisis – phase and a second – recovery – phase.

Strategy was therefore mainly focusing on combining crisis management with the development of frameworks for 'how to operate in a covid-19 world' as well as long-term impact mitigation.

It is therefore important to consider the issues, plan, risks, achievements and lessons learnt in this paper in the context of the collective knowledge, understanding and paradigm of March 2020 – early September 2020, recognising that these have shifted considerably since then. This especially applies to the lessons learnt, not all of which will still necessarily be valid today or remain valid in the future.

2. Main issues

The main issues identified during VCYPS phase 1 were:

For services:

- Services pausing, reducing or moving online due to covid-19 restrictions.
- Frontline staff in children's community services, e.g. health visitors and school nurses, were redeployed to adult health services.
- Huge pressure on services that did remain open, with staff exhaustion.
- Self-isolation guidance had a big impact on staffing levels.
- Lower than expected attendance at childcare/school hubs during the first lockdown.
- Contrary to expectations, the referral rate for safeguarding and wellbeing concerns
 did not increase, and at times was even lower than normal. As this decrease in
 referrals to statutory services was associated with an increase in calls to third sector
 helplines, there is concern that safeguarding/wellbeing issues may currently go
 undetected.

For children and young people:

- Digital exclusion.
- Disproportionate effect of covid-19 restrictions on most vulnerable and most disadvantaged children, young people and families.
- Impact of covid-19 restrictions on physical and mental health and wellbeing.

3. Phase 1 plan

A phase 1 plan was developed and agreed with policy leads, Directors and Ministers.

The attached slide deck outlining this plan was shared with external stakeholders.

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5. Achievements

Due to the nature of the covid-19 pandemic, the work done during VCYPS phase 1 developed organically over time, in response to newly identified issues and risks.

For example, in the first few weeks of the crisis, attendance of vulnerable children at the hubs was below expectation. In response, the Directors of Education and Social Services in Welsh Government issued a letter to all Directors of Education and Social Services in local authorities. The letter clarified expectations and asked for reassurance about the arrangements that were in place to keep in touch with vulnerable children.

There have been 10,848 MiFi devices and 9,717 software licences allocated to local authorities.

7. Lessons and conclusions

Lessons learnt from VCYPS phase 1 were considered during the course of August and September 2020. The main lessons and conclusions from VCYPS phase 1 are:

a. Children and young people

- The pandemic and the ensuing restrictions make all children and young people
 potentially vulnerable in a wide range of areas, including physical and mental health,
 emotional wellbeing, educational development, job security, (parental) income and
 housing stability, both in the short and the long term.
 - Decisions on covid-19 restrictions should take into account children and young people's short and long term health, wellbeing and development, supported by children's rights.
- As prepubescent children are less likely to catch the virus, less likely to become seriously ill and less likely to spread it, the risk of poor life attainment due to missing out on play, education and development is higher and more harmful than the risk of covid-19 in this age group¹.

A different approach is needed for different age groups, taking into account the different infection and transmission risk within these age groups.

b. Service provision

 As services close, reduce or move online, the safety net for vulnerable children and young people consists of childcare, schools, social services and local authorities.
 Children and young people who fall outside these services (e.g. pre-school children who do not attend childcare, children and young people in elective home education, further and higher education) may be less visible.

The priority for children and young people should be to keep childcare and educational settings open.

c. Workforce

• Frontline staff in children's services (e.g. health visitors, school nurses) should not be denied access to children and facilities.
